



Service History

Trevor Lloyd Morrison, BEM, APM

Registered Number 11570

On behalf of the New South Wales Police Force, it is with great honour that I read to you the Service and Award History of **Trevor Lloyd Morrison, BEM, APM** registered number 11570.

Lloyd joined the NSW Police Force as a trainee on **16 August 1965**. After successful completion of the initial training course at the Redfern, Bourke Street Academy, Lloyd commenced duty as a Probationary Constable at Campsie Police Station in number 13 Division on **17 September 1965**.

On **16 September 1966** when on patrol Constable Morrison accompanied another Officer responding to a complaint that a woman was being followed. When they arrived a male walked towards them, this male suddenly stabbed the senior officer to the stomach and quickly turned and stabbed Constable Morrison in the chest. After a struggle which lasted several minutes the officers overpowered the male and arrested him. In recognition of this, on **20 July 1967**, Lloyd was awarded the British Empire Medal for Gallantry. An award rarely received by members of the NSW Police.

On **16 September 1966**, Constable Morrison transferred to Belmore Police Station.

On 16 March 1967, Constable Morrison was recognised for his courage and tenacity in the arrest of a violent offender at Belmore.

On 16 August 1970 Lloyd was promoted to Constable First Class.

On 16 August 1971 Constable 1/c Morrison transferred to General Duties at Liverpool Police Station, number 22 Division.

On 10 July 1972 Constable 1/c Morrison transferred to general duties at Campbelltown Police Station.

On 16 August 1974 Lloyd was promoted to Senior Constable.

On 15 April 1981 Senior Constable Morrison was awarded the National Medal. This award recognises long and diligent service (over 15 years) by members of organisations that help the community during times of crisis.

On 1 February 1982 Lloyd was promoted to Sergeant 3rd class. He remained at Campbelltown Station undertaking the role of General Duties shift supervisor

On 10 September 1987, Sergeant Morrison was patrolling in Campbelltown and noticed a suspicious male driving a vehicle. At the time Sergeant Morrison had a work experience student with him in the police vehicle. Sergeant Morrison attempted to stop the vehicle, which drove into a deserted loading dock. As the vehicle stopped the male driver got out of the car with a sawn off shotgun. Whilst he was trying to load the gun, Sergeant Morrison ran at him after a brief struggle Sergeant Morrison disarmed the male. On **24 October 1988** Sergeant Morrison was awarded the Commissioners Commendation for Courage

and Devotion to Duty for this incident. This medal is awarded for action in the line of duty where outstanding courage was required.

On 14 June 1989 Lloyd was promoted to Senior Sergeant.

On 28 May 1992 Senior Sergeant Morrison was awarded the 1st Clasp to the National Medal. This clasp recognises 25 years long and diligent service

On 8 June 1992 Senior Sergeant Morrison was awarded the Australian Police Medal. This medal is awarded for distinguished service by a member of an Australian Police Force.

Senior Sergeant Morrison retired from the NSW Police on **14 December 1995**.

Lloyd was a proud member of the Police Force who served with distinction for 30 years. He was a brave and courageous man, to whom the people of NSW are forever indebted. His impact on those that served with him can be seen here today. Through his ‘war stories’, Lloyd has ensured his legacy within the Police Force will be felt for many generations to come.

As a son, brother, husband, father and grandfather you were a model of love and caring; of integrity and strength; you were one of the great men we should all aspire to be.
